

Living in the Balance November 2014

We were all 19 and two-thirds of the way through our freshman year at East Carolina when she was killed in a car accident outside Raleigh in a freak, March snowstorm. Her funeral was in eastern Maryland and as we rode with her parents to the visitation that long ago Friday evening, her mother said to us, "Last evening, I saw the most remarkable sunset. I just stared at the beauty in the colors and knew that I would not have Sue, but I would always have the sunsets to remind me of her. I will always have that."

My high school students went to the graves of their friends and their family. They sat on the ground crossed-legged and carried on conversations. Around a holiday, they might bring a pumpkin or a Valentine heart or a small Christmas tree. "Is that weird, Ms. Meade? Do you think it's crazy to talk to my dead granny? Sometimes I cry. Sometimes I laugh. Sometimes, I need to know something only she can answer. I might be weird, but sometimes I just lay on the grave. I don't care what other people think. I have something to say and I tell her. I think she hears. Do you think she hears, Ms. Meade? Well, it doesn't matter 'cause I think she does."

"She died, Wanda. My mother died in her own bed reading a book. My aunt said she looked like she was asleep. She had finished her Christmas pies and they were in the freezer. I don't think she thought she was going to die. Please tell me that this is going to get better." I reply simply, "I can't say it gets better.....I can say that it will get different." I hear her sigh over the phone, "Well, I do know that she went just like she wanted to and that is a good thing." Bless-ed are those who mourn for they will be comforted.

It has been six years since her "just shy of 40" year-old son died from a sudden illness. "If only" took up residence in her heart. "If only I had made him go to the doctor." "If only he hadn't traveled so much." She shared the regrets with me and then said, "We liked to talk over chocolate chip cookies and ale. And whenever I would express regret or anxiety over something that had happened in the past he'd say, 'Mom....don't dwell.' I remember those wise words. It helps get me through."

The grass had not yet grown over the ground on her older son's grave, when she hears the soulful strums of her younger son's guitar, playing a lament without words. The music mends the moment.

"Are you coming back?" she asks. I look at her oddly. "Of course, Mom, as soon as we grab supper, I'll be back. I'm spending the night remember?" "OK. See you soon," she said. When I returned and rounded the corner of the hospital corridor, the nurse waves frantically. "Her blood pressure has dropped to almost nothing! Hurry!" My mother was there quietly waiting for me. She looked at me one last time and I held her hand as her spirit left her body. Twenty years later I clearly remember her small hand in mine and her soft surrender. Remembering all this each time I make chocolate chip bars and her holiday cranberry salad.
