

Living in the Balance October 2011

Remember "slam" books of the early '60's? Yes, the junior high combination of *The National Inquirer* and the Holy Grail. Regardless of the cover, which could be plain or sequined, the "innards" were all alike. At the top of each page was a question. "Have you ever cheated on your boyfriend? Give details!" "Who is the hottest couple?" "Who is the biggest bitch in this school?" "What do you really think about Wanda Meade?" "Who have you spread a rumor about and why?" Those wishing to make an entry had a "sign in" number and after making comments on a page, they used their number rather than their name as their signature. Such anonymity allowed you to *really* write what your twelve-year-old mind thought with *total*, *total* honesty and without taking any responsibility or bearing any consequence. In typical junior high fashion, this truth telling was more like a bloodletting and frequently involved lots of swearing and name calling via a hit and run vehicle driven by meanness, cruelty, and vindictiveness.

I'm not proud to admit it, but I had a slam book as did almost all of my Mt. Rainer Junior High friends. Fortunately, our fascination with slam books was brief, but like a tornado, though short lived, the damage was deep. I see now that it had the potential for a profound wounding of a soul, and I wonder if the wreckage was ever repaired. Today, we have internet slam books and the electronic web of opportunity for massive soul wounding. Pick, click, and slam cloaked under the veil of screen names.

When I write a letter to the editor, I have to claim my authorship or the paper will not print it. But interestingly, others can go on the newspaper's website and write a comment under my letter using some fictitious on-line name, assuming, of course, that "Miss Gotta be Hotta" and "Mr. Hunkahunka" are not given names. While I really don't care whether anyone agrees with my writing or not, what bothers me is that people can say what they want without having to claim their opinions as their own. And the media and many citizens defend it. A part of the collective says, "Honestly, Wanda, get a grip, girl....this is free speech in the USA. It's in the Constitution!" Say what you want, when you want, to whomever you want has become the motto and mantra of the internet. Feel free to tell me to "fuck off." If I don't like it, then too bad because, "It's my right to free speech, bitch."

Somehow we think we are speaking into a vacuum. But our speech has energy. It vibrates. It has life. And once released, rage and vitriol language impact everything they touch. Trying to pull that ugly energy back is like trying to put feathers back in a pillow in the middle of a wind storm. It's impossible. And I'm not immune to the desire to do some spewing of my own. The entire time I've been writing this piece, there has been an uproar via email, and it has taken everything in me not to jump into the fray. But I know the power of words. And once I hit "send" there is no "do over."

I also know that my words impact me as well. Nothing, absolutely nothing, is inconsequential to the interconnectedness of humanity. I can cloak myself in a nomme du plume, but deep in my soul I know that when I wound you, I cut my own spirit's center. I've lost something of my inner Light when I seek to smother yours. Our internet postings are ours..... light or dark....screen name or no....they build up or harm the whole.

Free speech is a deception. A hoax. Sticks and stones will break our bones, and words have the power to hurt, wound, cut, and leave us bleeding. Internet postings aren't innocent. They aren't just "slamming" in fun. We aren't playing a game of no harm, no foul. People can truly hang on our words.....like the college student who.....sadly for us all.....used a rope.
